# The Pastor's Corner

#### Common Grace

Dear Members and Friends,

Do you remember what you had for dinner last night? The night before? Most of us can't. There are some meals we might remember for years. I can still remember a banquet Lee and I enjoyed in Porto, Portugal many years ago. I was speaking at an international conference and the Europeans always do conference banquets extremely well. This banquet took place at a Port wine "cave" (i.e. winery) overlooking the river and the old city. We had multiple courses (fish, potato, beef, vegetables, salad, fruit, cheese, etc.) with a different wine for each course. We conversed with friends and colleagues from around the world. It was a thoroughly memorable evening; but it's all those forgettable, common meals over the years that have nourished my body and kept me going physically. There are many things in life like this. We don't only live on the memorable experiences. There may be sermons we always remember, a worship service that we cannot forget, but it is the common weekly worship that we still need to nourish our souls. Life is filled with common grace, those indications of God's love and provision, that often go unnoticed by us. We usually don't pay attention to the beauty around us, the intricate web of connections between us, the people we know, and the creation which surrounds us. Most of us have events in our lives that are "spiritual highs", clear signs of God's grace and goodness, but we can fail to notice the breath in our bodies, the rain and snow that water the earth, the warmth of the sun, or the housing that shelters us from weather. These are all common grace, signs of God's love for all humanity. Grace is simply receiving what we don't deserve and haven't earned. It the good that God pours out just because God is God. If we develop the discipline of paying attention to common grace, we begin to develop an "attitude of gratitude" with God. We begin to thank and praise God for it all and not just the big things, the mountain top experiences. Maybe throughout our busy days in our busy lives at this busy time of year, we can practice taking brief pauses to notice all the undeserved gifts God gives us that we so often take for granted. And maybe we can begin to see the wonder and beauty of the commonplace.

# Music Notes

In just a couple more weeks Chancel Choir and Kirk Ringers will be taking their summer break. Every year this transition for the summer is bitter-sweet. On one hand I will miss seeing the singers and ringers weekly and making music together with them, but on the other hand I will enjoy my Wednesday afternoons with my family. As a matter of fact, I don't get to have much of any afternoons with my family during the year, so summer is special because all the evening rehearsals clear out and the week looks very different for us.

I can say that this year was very busy for our musical activities at FPCHS. The ensembles continually worked on music selections that were challenging but also rewarding. The musical contribution offered by all the ensembles- adult choir, bell choir, and brass — are a true blessing to everyone and for myself as well. I am very pleased with the dedication and commitment of all the musicians I get to collaborate with at FPCHS. The choir and ringers will come together a couple of times during the summer to participate with music for the worship services, but the rest of the time we'll enjoy a variety of talented musicians for special music.

As you know, the Chancel Choir together with other singers from the community have committed to participate at a choral festival in Rome, Italy this summer. We have been rehearsing on and off on Sunday afternoons throughout the year to learn the festival repertoire. It's been hard work, but rewarding. It's been a privilege to meet and work with so many wonderful singers that joined us from the community. Together with spouses and friends who are also joining us on this trip, we are thirty-two participants. We are leaving from Traverse City on Wednesday, June 21st, and coming back on the evening of Saturday, July 1st. We will be spending 4 days in Rome, 2 days in Florence, 2 days in Venice, and 1 day in Verona. In Rome we will be singing with the festival choir for a Mass in St. Peter's Basilica and for the festival concert at a beautiful church called Chiesa di Sant'Ignazio di Loyola. Besides rehearsing and singing with the festival choir in Rome, our itinerary includes guided tours that cover all the significant historical sites in each city. In addition to the tours, our group will attend an opera at the arena in Verona, and a Vivaldi concert in Santa Maria della Pietá (the church where Antonio Vivaldi worked and composed for the girls' orphanage in Venice). It is a very exciting trip with overwhelming beauty. I will share pictures and stories after our return. We ask for prayers for traveling mercies. The weather can be very hot, and these touristic places can be very crowded. I pray for everyone's health and safety already as I hope it will be an unforgettable experience for all the good reasons.

I'll conclude my letter by announcing the Summer Choir Camp for Children 2023 which will be on July 18-20, 9:00am-12:00pm. This program is for children 5+ where participants will sing, learn about music theory and music history, listen to music from different time periods, ring bells, play musical games, and sing some more. Last year we had an amazing turn out. I hope we can do the same this year if not better. As always, I will need a few volunteers each day. If you know any little ones that enjoy music, please tell them about this event. Thank you!



#### **Your Mission Team**

Dear Fellow Church Members and Friends,

Your Mission Team is so excited to tell you about a way to help orphans and widows at Echoes of Mercy School in Kenya. During the Lenten soup dinners, we watched videos about the needs of orphans and widows in the world. I shared with Pastor Kip that EOM is a Christian School that is making a huge difference in their very poor community in Western Kenya. Kip and your mission team have decided to help this community.



In 2010, Pastor Moses started the private school in his very poor home village. His goal was to educate the orphans and widow's children in a Christian School so they could become productive members of their society. In the beginning, there were

two classrooms and 50 children in the school. Today, there are 600 children, 15 classrooms, 21 teachers, 20 staff, a church, a mission house, and an almost completed orphanage at EOM. The school has preschool through middle school classes and in the near future they hope to have high school classes. The orphans and fatherless children attend the school for free. Other children pay a small tuition per quarter.

The children receive an excellent education from the dedicated teachers, they get two meals a day, a uniform, and a safe environment to learn. Each year 6th grade students in Kenya take national tests. EOM school has consistently been the top scoring school in their region and one of top scoring schools in the country! This is an amazing accomplishment! EOM only exists because Christians like us care enough to help. Our church has donated money to build a latrine and a kitchen, buy classroom furniture, rent a field to grow corn, and buy food.

There are also many widows in the community who have few resources to provide for their children. EOM is currently working to improve the lives of vulnerable widows. They have weekly Bible studies. They can receive help with micro financing, legal matters, and home repairs. Each month they receive a distribution of food like corn meal, lard, flour, beans, and rice to feed their families.

On a Sunday in May, we will talk about sponsoring children and widows. We will have about 35 children and 7 widows who need sponsors. You will be able to read their profiles. For \$50 a month you can provide so much for these children and widows. It is important for you to know that 100% of the money donated for sponsorship will go directly to Echoes of Mercy. We are working with Fruit of the Vine which is a small 501 c 3 mission group based in Charlevoix. They will wire transfer 100% of the money to Kenya. I have been to EOM two times and I know Pastor Moses. I can tell you that the children and widows appreciate every small blessing like a Bible, a baseball hat or a yoyo. They are joyful people who have hope for a good future for their children! Will you please consider helping??

### HNF/FSIL

Your support for Haiti Nursing Foundation/Faculty Science Nurses De Leogane remains vital. Thank you for believing in and being an active advocate and ambassador for the values, mission, and vision of HNF! Below are a few updates/reminders of what is going on at FSIL. For certain the challenges continue in Haiti but with your help FSIL will continue to graduate nurses and leaders for a better Haiti.

FSIL remains open and active with 205 students attending classes this academic year, including 84 first-year students. Many students rely on HNF for financial aid, including 20 students who receive full financial support, and 55 students who receive partial financial support.

Finding enough food for the campus has been challenging, but so far FSIL has managed to keep serving daily hot meals in the cafeteria. They have been making use of the large fruit trees on campus to supplement. More students have taken shelter in the campus dorms to avoid having to navigate dangerous roads to get to class. Generators and a solar energy system continue to provide power to the school, and plans are in the works to purchase a new generator FSIL continues to serve as a rampart in the community, providing outreach clinics, having graduates serve as school nurses in five elementary schools, having students share health education on the local radio station, and in December, hosting the annual Children's Christmas party, providing hot meals and toys to 800 children in Leogane and the surrounding area. The new, first of its kind in Haiti, master's in nursing education program is in progress and has proved so popular that the number of enrolled students has doubled since the program began, from12 students to 24 currently.I personally want to thank you for all you have done and all you continue to do to support this very important work in Haiti. Please be assured that your dollars make a difference! Blessings!

#### Pastor's Report:

- -Kip's continuing education has included viewing Transitional Ministry on line and reading Tim Keller's book on preaching during his study leave.
- -Announced that the broken baptismal bowl has been replaced.
- -The Three Year Action Trifold are ready to be mailed.
- -He has received The Midway Coaching Survey Results and has forwarded them to Session.

There was discussion regarding Kip's coaching and his midway results. Motion passed that the coaching continue for as long as Kip wants it to.

#### Committee Reports: Personnel

- -Approved the recommendation from Personnel to hire Tisha Cone to fill the position of Financial Manager at \$32 an hour for ten hours a week.
