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Our Guiding Questions

The Mission Study Team of 2024 grounded its work in three questions drawn from the work of Gil Rendle and Alice Mann in Holy Conversations. These questions served as guides to our work throughout 2025:

Who are we? We are a faithful community who loves God and demonstrates that love in ways large and small. We are seen as a congregation who serves as leaders in Harbor Springs, relied upon for counsel and compassion. We respect the role we have played in our community over the last century-and-a-half, but not defined by what has come before.

Who is our neighbor? Our neighbor is everyone in Harbor Springs and beyond. Our building is a community asset, placed in service to all. Our doors are open. As Christ commanded above all else, we “love our neighbors as ourselves.”

What is God calling us to do now? God has called us to dedicate ourselves more fully to the life of this church than ever before. In the absence of a permanent pastor, our Elders, Deacons, and congregation have stepped forward with new energy, responsibility, and resolve. We faithfully reflect His glory as we pray for the pastor God has prepared for us.

Progress on Our Mission Study Goals

In May of 2024, the congregation appointed a Mission Study Team to prepare for the search for a new pastor and help shape the steps we needed to take over the last year. Working amid uncertainty, the Team discerned four goals for the congregation. What follows is an honest and celebratory account of where we stand today.

1

GOAL 1: Create a sense of family and belonging through frequent, intergenerational interaction.

Our Fellowship Hour is full of laughter, coffee, and conversation that regularly outlasts the service itself. We have added a part-time Director of Youth Services. Our Advent and Lenten programs have been thoughtfully planned and joyfully attended. And we have grown our congregation's numbers without a permanent pastor. Not many churches can say that.

2

Goal 2: Bring pledges and expenses into a healthy, sustainable balance.

We completed a capital campaign that raised over \$185,500 to replace the church roof and HVAC system. Our annual pledge drive, conducted without a pastor, yielded \$256,910 in pledges from our congregation of 185. We begin 2026 with a budget surplus of \$146,166, without drawing on reserve investments.

Goal 3: Become a positive life force for good in the heart of Harbor Springs.

We anchor the local food pantry in volunteer hours and donations. We host high school Baccalaureate, AA meetings, and Grief Support Groups and summer school tutoring. This spring, Harbor Inc. will rent space in our lower level while their offices are remodeled, a concrete sign of our new posture as a shared community asset.

Goal 4: Move graciously and bravely into the future God intends for us.

We have shifted our annual stewardship focus from obligation to gratitude. We have opened our books to outside audit and adopted all recommendations. We are no longer reliant on major donors to patch budget holes. We are braver, more transparent, and more forward-looking than at any point in recent memory.



FINANCE COMMITTEE

The financial health of First Presbyterian Church of Harbor Springs has been transformed by the generosity, transparency, and shared commitment of our congregation. The figures below reflect careful stewardship by our Session's Elders and the faithfulness of our members.

2025 BUDGET PERFORMANCE

The 2025 annual pledge drive, conducted without a permanent pastor, yielded \$256,910 in pledges from our congregation of 185 members. We enter 2026 with a budget surplus of \$146,166.05, achieved without drawing on reserve investments. This result reflects a congregation that has taken collective ownership of its financial health.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The "Grow Together: Believe, Belong, Become" capital campaign raised over \$185,500 to fund critical facility improvements. Work completed or underway includes:

- HVAC systems have been updated and replaced throughout the building.
- A new roof is under contract with MB Roofing and will begin installation as soon as weather permits in Spring 2026.

These funds are separate from the operating budget and will be drawn down as physical improvements are completed.

ENDOWMENT & RESERVES

The church's endowment is held with the Petoskey/Harbor Springs Community Foundation. The non-spendable corpus stands at \$450,880, with combined available, spendable, and directed endowment investments totaling \$1,505,869. An additional cash reserve of approximately \$150,000 is maintained entering 2026.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

This past year marked a significant shift in how our congregation approaches financial accountability:

- An outside auditing firm was contracted to conduct an independent review of our books. Recommendations from the audit were adopted by the Session.
- The church no longer relies on one-off major gifts to balance the budget. Sustainable, broad-based giving from the full congregation now anchors our financial plan.
- Stewardship communication has been reframed — from obligation to gratitude — reflecting a congregation that gives joyfully and with purpose.
- All church accounts were reviewed to ensure that the stated purpose of each account aligns with its actual use, strengthening accountability and clarity across our financial structure.
- The committee devoted time to a thorough review of the church's planned giving policy, ensuring it reflects current best practices and the long-term intentions of our generous members.

We are grateful to every member whose generosity has made this year possible. Our finances are in order, our facility is being renewed, and our congregation is growing. The foundation is solid. The future is bright.

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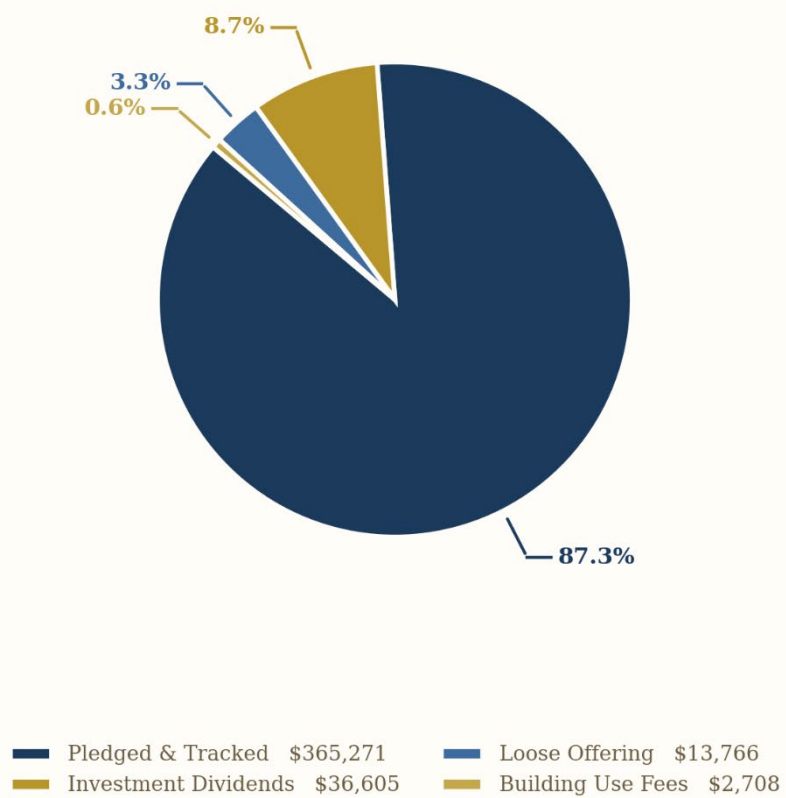

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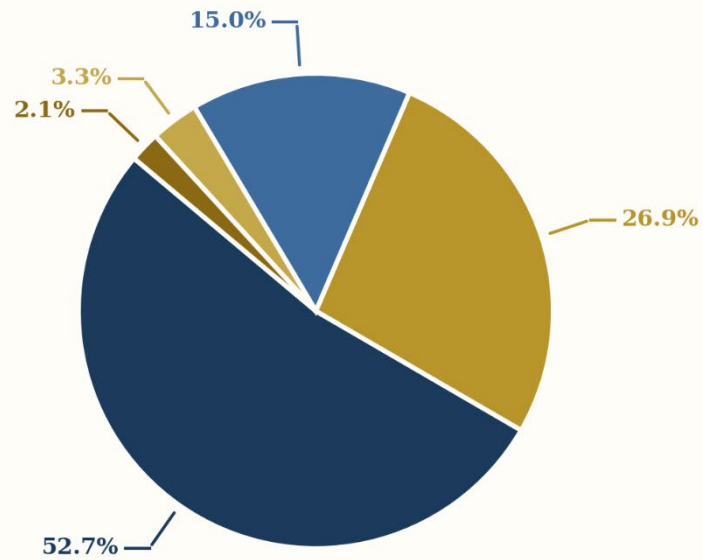

Total Expenses: \$274,505

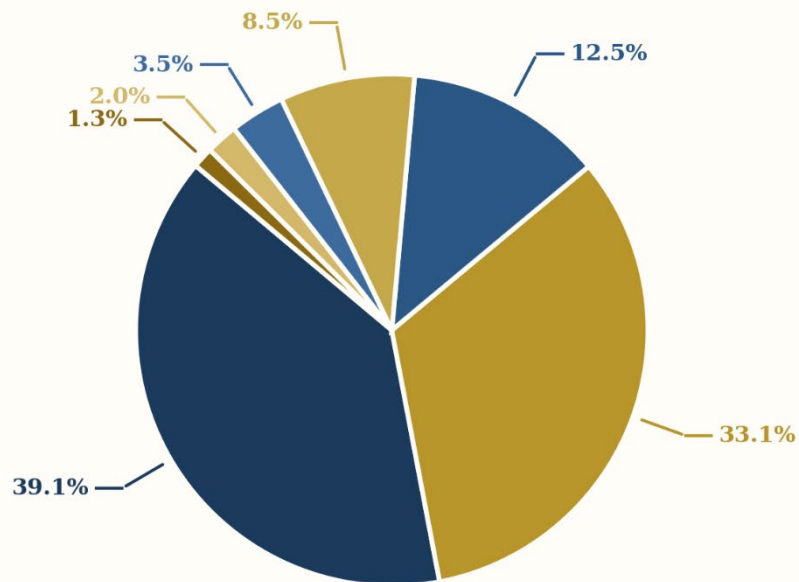

The central focus of the Worship & Music Committee in 2025 was maintaining continuity and integrity in worship through a period of staff vacancies and transitions. Despite these challenges, the congregation was served faithfully through the dedication of gifted musicians and worship leaders.

The Choir provided special music for Easter under the direction of Meg Ideker, then continued under the leadership of Jamie Platte during the Fall and Advent seasons. Our brass ensemble was featured regularly throughout the year, joining the choir for both the Easter service and a Christmas Eve Service of Lessons and Carols.

Following the departure of our Interim Minister in September, Worship & Music partnered with the Personnel Committee to engage the Reverend Rob Miller as a guest preacher, who provided consistent and capable worship leadership over a multi-week period and continued to serve well into 2026. The congregation was blessed to have the leadership of Rick Donahue, CRE who serves as our interim moderator during this continued transition.

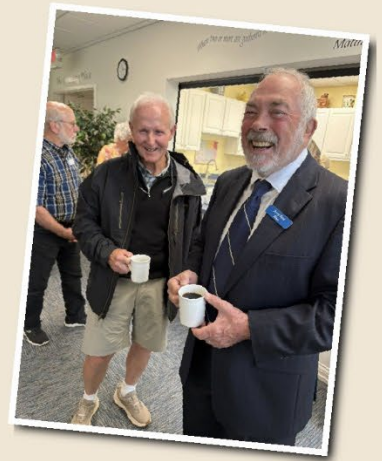
LOOKING AHEAD TO 2026

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Christian Education Team provides a wide range of opportunities to learn about and experience God, Jesus, and the growth of faith — both individually and as a community. Working alongside the Pastor, other committees, community resources, and dedicated volunteers, CE organizes educational and enriching activities for children, youth, and adults at First Presbyterian Church of Harbor Springs.

CHILDREN

Sunday School continued into early 2025 using the PCUSA curriculum Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living, with a unit on Baptism. In March, Sunday School was temporarily suspended by committee recommendation and Session approval. While the program and curriculum were strong, consistently low attendance meant there was not a sufficient critical mass of families to sustain regular programming.

CE sponsored an Easter Egg Hunt in April. Vacation Bible School, planned and led by Jodi Chattaway and a dedicated crew of adult and teen volunteers, was held July 28–31. Using the Group curriculum True North: Trusting Jesus in a Wild World, VBS welcomed 11 children and was highly successful. The VBS Sunday worship service and picnic on August 3rd was well attended by the congregation.

YOUTH

Interim Pastor Dr. Nancy Kahaian provided leadership for the youth program, meeting twice monthly with adult volunteer support. Senior Sunday on June 1st honored three high school graduates.

The youth group completed a mission trip June 18–22 in South Bend, IN. Activities included:

- Fundraising support for the St. James Cathedral Homeless Shelter
- Urban Emergent Homeless Walk circle tour
- Food gleaning with the Cultivate Rescue Mission
- Tour of the University of Notre Dame campus
- Cleaning and preparation of Redbud Summer Camp for underprivileged children
- Minor league Cubs baseball game
- Day trip by train to Chicago
- Sunday worship with the host Presbyterian Church in South Bend

Each participant was supported by a prayer partner from the congregation. Youth led worship on June 29th to share their mission experiences.

In July, Sara Creutz was hired as part-time Youth Director, beginning work with students in September. Fall activities met twice monthly and included a beach picnic, pickleball instruction, a football tailgate, and mission outreach — assembling battery packs for Lights for Ukraine with Rick Donohoe — plus two additional November activities. The CE Team and Pastor Nancy agreed to delay starting a new confirmation class until a new permanent pastor is in place.

ADULT EDUCATION

Adult ministry continued to support five established weekly study groups:

- Men's Fellowship — lectionary-based Bible study
- BSF (Bible Study and Fellowship) — standardized curriculum program
- Women of the Word — book study group
- Community Bible Study at Perry Farm Village
- Traditional Men's Bible Study

Pastor Nancy led Sunday morning Bible study series on Galatians (winter/spring) and on the prophets Amos and Hosea. For Advent, CE coordinated two complementary studies using The Advent Tree: Meeting Jesus in God's Big Story by Kara Eidson. Guest Pastor Rob Miller led a five-session Sunday morning book study, while Barbara Jaquith led three weekly Thursday Advent Fellowship soup suppers with continuing study of the same text.

Thank you to all the volunteers whose generosity of time and spirit gives our programs life. We are grateful to serve the congregation and community of First Presbyterian Church of Harbor Springs.



MISSION & OUTREACH COMMITTEE

PCUSA SPECIAL OFFERINGS

For the first time, First Presbyterian became a Four for Four church by collecting all four PCUSA Special Offerings in 2025.

- One Great Hour of Sharing (March) — Supports disaster relief, hunger programs, and community self-development.
- Pentecost Offering (May) — Supports faith opportunities for young people; 40% directed to the Women's Resource Center for children at risk.
- Peace & Global Witness Offering (October) — Promotes peacemaking and reconciliation; 25% given to the Northern Michigan chapter of Interfaith Common Ground.
- Christmas Joy Offering (December) — 50% supports retired church workers and their families; 50% supports students at Presbyterian-affiliated schools and colleges serving communities of color.

FOOD OF THE MONTH PROGRAM

Monthly food collections throughout the year benefited the Harbor Springs Community Food Pantry. Highlights included 125 turkeys, 456 rolls of toilet paper, 166 cans of hearty soup, 75 picnic bags for the 4th of July, 125 boxes of Christmas candy, baking supplies, condiments, canned fruit, flour, sugar, salt, and healthy snacks.

COMMUNITY SERVICE & OUTREACH

- Hillside Teas — Hosted Valentine's Day and Mother's Day Teas for residents of Hillside Apartments. The Valentine's Tea featured a sing-along led by Tiera Morse and Maureen Delaney-Lehman; the Mother's Day Tea was entertained by the High School Jazz Band.
- Lenten Supper — Served as hosts for the community Lenten Supper.
- Teacher & Support Staff Appreciation — The full congregation participated during Fellowship time to create appreciation cards for local teachers and school staff.
- Ingathering & Wishlist Collections — Raised \$3,511 in special offerings.

CHRISTMAS WISHLIST

Working with area schools and the American Legion Auxiliary, the team helped 22 local families with Christmas gifts and food. Each family received handmade Christmas cards created by middle and high school art students, cookies to choose from at pickup, and congregation-provided gifts and food cards. As a special holiday treat, the church's youth group volunteered to help pass out the collected gifts to the families in need.

MONETARY GRANTS — GENERAL FUND

The committee directed \$10,500 in outreach giving from the Mission/Outreach account:

- Habitat for Humanity — \$1,000
- Salvation Army (heating program) — \$1,000
- Harbor Springs Community Food Pantry — \$500
- Harbor Springs Friendship Center — \$1,000
- Haiti Nursing Program — \$2,000 (supports half the educational cost of one nursing student)
- Crop Walk (global hunger) — \$500
- St. Vincent de Paul Society — \$500
- Youth Group Mission Trip — \$2,000
- Mission Pledge to Presbytery — \$1,000 (from the Roma Boline restricted account)

Throughout 2025, the Building & Grounds Committee and congregation volunteers worked diligently — both independently and together — to maintain and improve the beauty and function of our church's building and surrounding grounds. The accomplishments listed below reflect the ongoing needs of the church and the generous willingness of our congregation to meet them.

COMMITTEE TRANSITIONS

We offer our sincere thanks to Jack Stackhouse and Bill Horwath, who retired from the committee after many years of faithful service to the congregation. We also bid farewell to Scott Carbeck, who stepped down upon his retirement from Wentworth Builders in June. Their contributions to the care of our building and grounds have been greatly appreciated.

2025 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Replaced the carpet in the Gathering Place.
- Received a donation oak mission style furniture from McLaren Hospital Foundation as a small-group place to meet in the Gathering Place.
- "Wear Your Grubbies to Church Day" — Volunteers mobilized to clear the church grounds following spring ice storm damage, hauling multiple loads of debris to county-designated disposal sites. The Deacons provided pizza and snacks to the hardy crew of volunteers.
- Johansen Tree Service was of great help to the church in 2025 for trimming or removing the trees damaged by the ice storm, reattaching the soffit above the Pastor's Office pulled off by the wind, and completing the church's "Greening" with the wreath on the front portico.
- Secured MB Roofing as the contractor for a new church roof. Installation is scheduled for Spring 2026.
- Evaluated multiple bids to replace the HVAC for the offices, nursery and music room. Chose W.W. Fairbarin and Sons was the most qualified bidder. Installation was overseen by John Crawford. Each space now has a ceiling cassette that provide both heating and cooling.
- Replaced failed AC units with high-efficiency heat pumps, providing both heating and cooling for the offices, nursery, and music room.
- Scott Cavell installed a new dishwasher in the kitchen.
- Assisted with the Memorial Garden and Columbarium area clean-up performed over several days by Ralph and Carol DeWitt, Pastor Nancy's cousins.
- The Lower Level Youth Room refrigerator was replaced with a donated unit secured by Kathy McCreight.

- Kathy McCreight and Bob Maki teamed-up to refurbish the Nursery with Kathy stripping the wallpaper border and clearing the contents and Bob prepared the walls and repainted.
- Assisted Tom and Lisa Ervin and two Walstrom staff members in removing ice storm damaged limbs from trees along the western edge of the church's property.
- Recommended to Session that the large conifer on the west side of the Gathering Place be donated to the City of Harbor Springs as the Downtown Christmas Tree.

- Sara Creutz — Youth Program Director. Sara joined the staff in July and has quickly become a valued presence in the lives of our young people, bringing creativity and dedication to youth programming.
- Jamie Platte — Interim Music Director. Jamie stepped in to provide skilled and steadfast musical leadership for the congregation during the Fall and Advent seasons, guiding the choir and supporting worship with care and artistry.

These appointments reflect the committee's commitment to identifying talented individuals who share our congregation's values and are well matched to the needs of our church family.

We are grateful for the dedication of our staff, whose faithfulness and professionalism have been a gift to this congregation — especially in a year that asked so much of everyone. We look forward to welcoming new pastoral leadership and continuing to build a staff team that serves this church with excellence.

The Deacons of First Presbyterian Church of Harbor Springs are called to a ministry of compassion, service, and care — tending to the physical and spiritual needs of the congregation and reaching outward into the community. In 2025, through a year of transition and renewal, the Deacons remained a steady and faithful presence in the life of our church.

FELLOWSHIP & HOSPITALITY

The Deacons continued their ministry of welcome and hospitality through faithful service at Sunday Fellowship Hour, where nearly all who worship with us stay to share in conversation, coffee, and community. This weekly gathering has become one of the most cherished expressions of our congregational life, consistently drawing people of all ages into connection with one another.

The Deacons also played a central role in supporting the congregation's Advent and Lenten programs — preparing spaces, providing refreshments, and creating an atmosphere of warmth and belonging that allowed these seasons of reflection to be experienced together as a church family.

SPIRITUAL CARE & HOME COMMUNION

Caring for the spiritual well-being of our members — especially those who are homebound, ill, or facing life's difficulties — remains a cornerstone of the Deacons' ministry. In 2025, renewed emphasis was placed on extending the Table to those who cannot be present on Sunday mornings. The Deacons made a concerted effort to provide home communion to congregation members in need, ensuring that no one is separated from the sacramental life of the church.

This ministry of presence — showing up, sitting with, and praying alongside those who are struggling — reflects the heart of diaconal service and the love of Christ made tangible in our community.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

First Presbyterian Church of Harbor Springs is home to an active Stephen Ministry — a proven, Christ-centered program that equips congregation members to provide high-quality, one-to-one care to those experiencing life's difficulties. Stephen Ministry complements and extends the work of the Deacons, ensuring that the caring ministry of this church reaches those who need it most, when they need it most. Together, the Deacons and Stephen Ministers form a network of grace that reflects God's love in practical and personal ways.

We are grateful to serve this congregation and this community. It is a privilege to bear one another’s burdens, and in doing so, to fulfill the law of Christ.
